Detaille Island & The Gullet *South of the Antarctic Circle*

Detaille Island *lies in Lallemand Fjord off Crystal Sound, on the Loubet Coast, east of Adelaide Island. The hut at this site is the British Antarctic Survey's Station W, which was evacuated in 1959 when sea ice and weather made relief by ship impossible. At this time, base personnel closed the station and transferred to Station Y at Horseshoe*

Island. Research undertaken at Detaille Island site had focused on surveying, geology and meteorology. The hut was cleaned up by BAS in 1996/7.

The Gullet is a narrow channel between the eastern extremity of Adelaide Island and the west coast of Graham Land, Antarctica, separating Hansen Island and Day Island and connecting the heads of Hanusse Bay and Laubeuf Fjord. This area was first explored in 1909 by the French Antarctic Expedition under Jean-Baptiste Charcot who, though uncertain of the existence of the channel, sketched its probable position on the charts of the expedition. The channel was first visited and roughly surveyed in 1936 by the British Graham Land Expedition under John Rymill. It was resurveyed and given this descriptive name in 1948 by members of the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey.

Bongrain Point & Horseshoe Island

Marguerite Bay is an extensive bay on the west side of the Antarctic

Peninsula, which is bounded on the north by Adelaide Island and on the south

by Wordie Ice Shelf, George VI Sound and Alexander Island. The mainland coast on the Antarctic Peninsula is

Fallières Coast. Islands within the bay include Pourquoi Pas Island, Horseshoe Island and Lagotellerie Island. Marguerite Bay was discovered in 1909 by the French Antarctic Expedition under Dr. Jean-Baptiste Charcot, who named the bay for his wife.

Bongrain Point is a headland which forms the south side of the entrance to Dalgliesh Bay on the west side of Pourquoi Pas Island, off the west coast of Graham Land. It was surveyed in 1936 by the British Graham Land Expedition under John Rymill, and re-surveyed in 1948 by the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey, who named the point for Maurice Bongrain, surveyor and First Officer of the Pourquoi Pas, the ship of the French Antarctic Expedition, 1908–10, who was responsible for the first surveys of the area.

Horseshoe Island is an island 12 km (7 mi) long and 6 km (4 mi) wide occupying most of the entrance to Square Bay, along the west coast of

Graham Land, Antarctica. It was discovered and named by the British Graham Land Expedition under John Rymill who mapped the area by land and from the air in 1936–37. Its name is indicative of the crescentic alignment of the 600 to 900 m (2,000 to 3,000 ft) peaks which give a comparable shape to the island.

NENY FJORD is a fjord which is ten miles (16 km) long in an eastwest direction and five miles (8 km) wide, between Red Rock Ridge and Roman Four Promontory on the west coast of Graham Land, Antarctica. This coast was first explored in 1909 by Jean-Baptiste Charcot who, it appears, gave this name to a feature somewhat north of the bay described. The British Graham Land Expedition (BGLE) made a detailed survey of this area in 1936–1937, and in correlating their work with that of Charcot applied the name Neny Fjord to the bay between Red Rock Ridge and Roman Four Promontory. The name has become established in this latter position through international acceptance and use.

STONINGTON ISLAND is a rocky island lying 1.8 km (1.1 mi) north-east of Neny Island in the eastern part of Marguerite Bay, off the west coast of Graham Land.

This Day in Polar History

15 February 2009, Reported that the first phase of construction on the Ross Island Wind Farm was completed in Antarctica. The three 333KW wind turbines will reduce the amount of diesel power generation (by around 463,000 litres per year) and will link to the electrical grids of both McMurdo Station and Scott Base.

Stonington Island is 0.75 km (0.47

mi) long from north-west to south-east and 0.37 km (0.23 mi) wide and was formerly connected by a drifted snow slope to Northeast Glacier on the mainland. Stonington Island was chosen as the site for the East Base of the United States Antarctic Service (USAS) Expedition (1939–1941) and named after Stonington, Connecticut, home port of the sloop Hero in which Captain Nathaniel Palmer sighted the Antarctic continent in 1820.

HOVGAARD ISLAND is an island 6 km (3 nmi) long, lying off the northwest coast of Kyiv Peninsula, 2.8 km (1.5 nmi) southwest of Booth Island in the Wilhelm Archipelago, Antarctica. It was discovered and named "Krogmann-Insel" (Krogmann Island) by the German 1873–74 expedition under Eduard Dallmann, but the name Hovgaard, after Polar explorer and officer of the Danish Navy Andreas Hovqaard, applied by the Belgian Antarctic Expedition, 1897–99, under Gerlache, has overtaken the original name in usage. The name Krogmann Point has been given to the western extremity of Hovgaard Island.

LEMAIRE CHANNEL is an 11 km long by 1.6 km wide (7 mi by 1 mi) passage that runs from False Cape Renard to Cape Cloos, separating Booth Island from the Antarctic continent. It was discovered by Dallmann's German expedition of 1873 but Gerlache was the first to navigate the channel in 1898 and named it in honour of Charles Lemaire, a Belgian explorer of the Congo. At its narrowest, the Lemaire Channel is less than 800 m (0.5 mi) wide with towering peaks up to 1000 m overhead. The channel can be full of icebergs and sea ice which makes manoeuvring difficult. However, this is a good location for seeing crabeater seals, Weddell seals and leopard seals hauled out on ice floes and Minke whales in transit. Lemaire Channel is nick-named Kodak Canal, Fuji Funnel and Agfa Alley and is one of the most scenic channels in the Peninsula.

Danco Island & Orne Harbour

Antarctic Peninsula

Expedition Morning

This morning, dependent on weather, wind, sea and wildlife conditions, we hope to land and explore at **Danco Island**. The 'Gentoo' Mud Room Group will be called first.

Expedition Afternoon

In the afternoon dependent on weather, wind, sea and wildlife conditions, we hope to explore and land in **Orne Harbour**. The 'Humpback' Mud Room Group will be called first.

- After Dinner Talk: Join shark scientist and underwater photographer Jonathan Green for his introduction on 'Whale Sharks The Ocean Giants' in the *Expedition Lounge*. Learn more about the gentle giants of the oceans and the many mysteries this species still hold for us. A research project supported by Planeterra.

This will be following by a **Movie Night - 'Galapagos: Secrets of the Ocean Giants'**, a Canadian documentary film following a team of scientists as they study Whale Sharks. In the Galapagos Islands, a group of scientists works to understand the movements of the world's largest fish: the whale shark. Without understanding their breeding and migrations, we cannot hope to protect them (31 min). And there will be popcorn!

DANCO ISLAND lies in the southern end of the Errera Channel. It is relatively small, 1.6 km (1 mi) long, but quite high (180 m or 590 ft). The view from the top of Danco Island is spectacular due to the heavily crevassed glaciers in the surrounding mountains. This section of the Errera Channel is a hotspot for Minke and Humpback whales which can often be heard from shore. Beautiful rolled icebergs also tend to collect in this area of the channel. Danco Island is home to approximately 1,600 breeding pairs of Gentoo penguins which breed quite high up on the slopes. Danco Island was also home to the British Antarctic Survey's Station O. Fieldwork conducted from this hut focused on surveying the region and geological research. It was closed in 1959 when work was completed. The hut was removed in 2004, a plaque indicating its location can still found on shore.



This Day in Polar History

01 March 1903, Captain Larsen and the men of the vessel Antarctic spent their first full day on Paulet Island, slaughtering 1100 penguins in preparation for a long winter in darkness.

ORNE HARBOUR lies on the northwest side of the Arctowski Peninsula, near the northern entrance to Errera Channel. It was discovered by Gerlache in 1898 and named by whalers. The harbour has two parts and is surrounded by glaciers. At the southern entrance lies Spigot Peak, a black 286 m (938 ft) tall spire named after a spigot or cask plug.

GOUDIER ISLAND is home to the restored British Antarctic Survey (BAS) hut and museum. The BAS hut was Station A, referred to as Bransfield House and occupied between 1943 and 1962. Research carried out at this site focused on surveying the region, geology, meteorology and botany but after 1950 the emphasis switched to ionospheric research. The hut was restored in 1996 and is now open to visitors during austral summers. The historic site features an extraordinary museum as well as a post office and gift shop where stamps, postcards and souvenirs may be purchased. Mail sent from Port Lockroy, however, can take from three weeks to three months to get to its final destination.

JOUGLA POINT was discovered and named by the French Antarctic Expedition under Charcot, 1903–05. He believed it to be a peninsula, however considered the term point more appropriate because of its small size. Jougla Point is home to numerous nesting gentoo penguins as well as blue-eyed shags.

The **MELCHIOR ISLANDS** are a small group of low, ice-covered islands lying near the center of Dallmann Bay in the Palmer Archipelago, Antarctica. They were first seen but left unnamed by a German expedition under Eduard Dallmann, which explored the area between 1873 and 1874. Yet it was French explorer Jean-Baptiste Charcot who re-sighted and finally charted them on his third expedition in 1903-1905. Charcot named what he believed to be a large island in the group "Île Melchior" after Vice Admiral Jules Melchior of the French Navy, but later surveys proved Charcot's Île Melchior to be two islands, now called "Eta Island" and "Omega Island".
